-Good for teens
- 3) My Adopted Child, There's No One Like You
-Moma Bear and adopted Panda
- 4) All About Adoption, How Families are Made and How Kids Feel About It
-Comprehensive
- 5) Happy Adoption Day (McCutcheon and Paschkis)
-Illustrated book about Adoption Day
- 6) Why Was I Adopted? (Livingston)
-Illustrated for children
- 7) W.I.S.E. UP Powerbook
-Workbook for kids to help them explain adoption to others and helps them be prepared to answer people's adoption questions.
- 8) Adoption is for Always
-Good for pre-teens, kids struggling with the idea of adoption
- 9) I'm Still Me (Lifton)
-Novel written for teens about a child attempting to research her birth family
- 10) Adopted and Wondering, Drawing out Feelings (Heegaard)
-Workbook for kids to draw out thoughts and feelings

-Good for any adoptive parent

-Good for families considering adopting who want more information
- 4) The Jonathon Letters (Trout and Thomas)
-Correspondence between adoptive parent and the treating therapist
- 5) Telling the Truth to your Adopted or Foster Child, Making Sense of the Past (Keefer and Schooler)
-Would help parents who are trying to explain adoption to their child. Helps parents who are not inclined to be open.
- 6) A Child's Journey Through Placement (Fahlberg)
-Probably for the professional. Will help understanding and working with kids who have been through multiple placements
- 7) Toddler Adoption (Hopkins-Best)
- 8) Making Sense of Adoption, A Parent's Guide (Melina)
-Conversations and activities for families formed through adoption, donor insemination, surrogacy, and in vitro fertilization
- 8) How to Adopt at Child
- 9) Raising Our Children's Children (Doucette-Dudman)
-Written by an adoptive grandparent and a therapist. Well written and easy to read. Uses lots of real-life vignettes.
- 10) Grandparents as Parents (Toledo & Brown)
-Well written, easy to read, comprehensive, should be very useful for grandparents.
